Project Details

Brief summary of the Project:

This summer project aims to investigate how Trinity is positioned to engage with the question 'what does it mean to come from a working-class background in Trinity today?'. As leading research-intensive institution and Ireland's oldest university historically associated with more privileged and affluent backgrounds, at Trinity there are currently many strands of work ongoing to break down those barriers and reinvent how class is understood, experienced, and enacted within university life. The Laidlaw Scholar will review, analyse, and develop a coherent set of insights into what the potential next steps are for embedding and advancing this theme within Trinity, drawing on a range of collaborative efforts including the work of the EDI Office, the Trinity Access Programmes (TAP), the Civic Engagement Office, the current 'Class Acts' seminar series, relevant HEA reports and available data and the body of advocacy to create 'Socio-economic Status' as the 10th protected ground in Irish equality legislation.

- Interest in EDI, policy and social justice themes
- Ability to work independently
- Ability to review literature and content on relevant themes and summarise key insights

Details of supervision arrangements: Primary academic supervisor is Prof. Lorraine Leeson, Laidlaw Scholar will also be supported through engagement with the multidisciplinary team in the Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion Office. Project will focus on student-led research, discussions, and independent writing with defined supervision checkpoints in-person at the EDI Office on main Trinity campus.
